Those attending the December meeting of CCAS will be treated to a demonstration of a computer Internet connection by Dr. Michael Martens, Associate Professor of Physics at West Chester University. A computer Internet connection allows the user access to a great many fields of interest. Dr. Martens will attempt to find sources of astronomical information available on Internet. This connection will be most exciting, especially to those of us who do not have access to such equipment and to those of us who are new to this source of information and communication.

All members are invited and may bring friends. Socializing over coffee will follow the presentation.

NOVEMBER CCAS MEETING

Prue Campbell, graduate student at West Chester University gave an excellent demonstration of the planetarium projector in Schmucker Science Center at the CCAS November meeting.

She projected the central meridian, ecliptic and equatorial circles onto the dome which helped everyone understand the celestial coordination system. Identifying familiar constellations became increasingly difficult as more and more stars were projected. Prue showed how the stars would appear if one were at the North Pole or at the equator.

In addition to the projector demonstration, Prue displayed slides taken by the Hubble Space

Telescope before and after its repair. The comparison revealed the enhanced resolution and increased magnitude capability.

CCAS members and friends are invited to our December observing session at the Brandywine Valley Association(BVA) property on route 842, approximately 6 miles west of West Chester.

Saturn and the first quarter moon will be high in the west followed by many deep sky objects. Mars rises about 10:30 PM but still appears rather small (9 arc sec.). Larger 'scopes may glimpse the polar ice cap and the beginning of surface detail. Binoculars will show the daily motion of Mars passing 2.3 degrees north of Regulus.

A limited number of electrical outlets are available. Those bringing 'scopes may drive up the farm road to the left of the parking lot.

Members not owning 'scopes are encouraged to come and enjoy the views through 'scopes. 'Scopes owners are always pleased to have others look through them.

The BVA is allowing us to use their facilities and CCAS members are reminded that we should leave the area as clean as we found it. Your cooperation will be appreciated.

ASTEROID (4): VESTA

If you have never seen an asteroid, now is your chance. Between the orbits of Mars and Jupiter lies the orbits of many minor planets (asteroids). Vesta, one of the four largest asteroids, is easily visible with binoculars at magnitude 7. It brightens to mag. 6.4 on December 25 and fades to mag. 7 by the end by the end of January. On December 9, Vesta can be located just 4 1/2 degrees north northwest of Gamma Gemini passing close to Nu Gemini.

Vesta moves west northwest at a rate of 14 arc minutes (almost 1/2 the apparent diameter of the moon) per day. Note Vesta's position among the stars on the first night, then note its change in position on a following night. This will verify its identity. You may then like to follow its movements in the next few months. In mid-February its path among the stars turns around and goes eastward and fades to mag. 8. A close approach to Epsilon Gemini on April 24 permits one to see its movement in less than an hour.


